COURSE OUTLINE

THEO 2221 / THEO 5321 Early and Medieval Church History (Church History I)

Teacher: Jason Lam

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Venue: CCT T41

Description: The purpose of the course is to introduce the students to the historical and theological

developments in the early and medieval church from Jesus to the dawn of the

Protestant Reformation.

Expected Outcome

- The students will gain a general knowledge of the theological and ecclesial development during the covered period.
- The students will get acquainted with different perspectives on church history and with issues that are still debated.
- The students will develop sensitivity regarding the diversity of Christian faith expressions.

Further expectations:

- The students will gain historical depth in their theological reflection.
- The students learn about historical forms of contextualization.
- The critical study of church history helps the students to recover the voices of those who have been condemned as heresy.
- Students will learn about how the Christian belief and Christian institutions caused social, political, and cultural change.

Structure of the course

- a) 1 hour tutorial in groups with student-led discussions
- b) 2 hours lecturing

1. Tutorials

- Every week a different student (from THEO 5321) is in charge of leading the tutorial; and another student(s) [depending on the number of students enrolled in the course] is responsible of writing minutes for the tutorial.
- Goals of the tutorial:
 - i. to make all the students involved in a meaningful discussion
 - ii. to think what has been learnt in the last lesson
 - iii. to preview the main issues before next lecture
 - iv. to reflect and critically discuss the past
 - iv. to apply and to relate the past to the present
- Responsibility of the **tutorial leader**:

The role of the tutorial leader is **not** to teach or to give an oral presentation or so. The most important role is to keep the discussion going and to make sure that everybody finds equal opportunity to participate.

- Responsibility of the one writing minutes:

Summarize the discussion and some of the important findings.

For THEO 2221 students: you may compare your expected answers before the tutorial (and

lecture) to the questions discussed and the findings in the process. In addition, you may write about your reflections in relation to your own experiences. (within 3000 words) For THEO5321 students: same as THEO2221 students; plus a critical analysis after synthesizing the lecture and reading relevant materials to form a short reflection essay. (within 5000 words)

- Date of submission. Within I week after the tutoria.

2. Take-home Exams

The exams provide an opportunity to revise the historical events learned.

- Provisional time: 19 Oct and 7 Dec 2016
- The exams consist mainly of short questions and expected short answers; you may also be asked to write short essays of introducing some theologians or historical events.
- The questions set for THEO2221 and THEO5321 may be different.
- Date of submission: within 2 weeks after the exam paper is posted on the website.
- Assessment Criteria:
- Content: do the answers reflect a good understanding of the materials read?
- Thought: Does the student critically engage with the thoughts expressed?
- Form: Neatness of the paper, good structuring, concise writing, mastering of language and proper use of source materials
- Creativity: Does the form of the presentation show creative dialogue with the historical events or thoughts? (Additional resource materials, creative presentation)

Course assignments: please follow the following rules concerning submission:

- 1. Each student must upload an electronic file by 11.55 pm of the due date on the blackboard platform. Please note: **only standard word file** are welcomed, **no WinZip, no pdf** or other formats. Wrong file will be regarded as no submission.
