Planning and Leading Worship Services / THEO5544

Mondays: September 4 – November 27 (7:00 – 9:15 PM) ELB 207

Course Description:

This course explores the practical ways of planning and leading public worship services of our time which reflect biblical and theological perspectives on worship. Special attention will be given to principles of worship design, diverse expressions of worship elements, creative ways of leading corporate worship, and evaluation of current worship practices. Students collaborate to plan and lead worship service.

Learning Outcomes:

By the end of this course, students are able to:

- 1. Articulate biblical and theological perspectives on worship
- 2. Develop corporate worship services implementing diverse traditional and creative expressions of worship elements relevant to a local church.
- 3. Lead worship services in an effective and confident way.
- 4. Demonstrate scholarly informed perspectives on issues associated with corporate worship of our time.

Course Requirement:

- 1. Class participation (30%): Active involvement in class discussion!
- 2. Design of Worship Service and Presentation (40%):
 - It includes 1) Statement of Worship and Core Values incorporating reading assignment and lectures (1page, 10%), <u>Due: Oct. 16</u> and 2) One annotated worship service employing traditional and creative elements and expressions of worship services with full scripts (30%), <u>Due: Nov. 06</u>
- 3. One Reflection paper (30%): 3,000 words, <u>Due: Nov. 30</u> *The Worship Architect* by Constance Cherry. See **Guideline** below.

Grading Rubrics:

Coursework will be evaluated according to student's demonstration of:

- 1. Contribution to the class discussion and practicum
- 2. Clarity and quality of arguments and opinions of paper which incorporates source materials including class discussions (Please follow Chicago Manual of Style Online method of citation [http://www.chicagomanualofstyle.org]
- 3. Creativity and structural flow in worship design
- 4. Effort and ability to provide scholarly and practical application to worship today

Reflection Paper Guideline:

Reflection paper is not a summary of a book, but a conversation with the author. In this conversation, discuss 2-3 topics or subjects or issues on which you agree with the author, and 2-3 topics or subjects or issues on which you disagree with the author. In this discussion,

support your arguments by using other sources (books or articles) and class discussions including lectures. In this conversation, it is also expected to hear what you have learned from this reading (*The Worship Architect* by Constance M. Cherry). Please follow *The Chicago Manual of Style* method of citation [http://www.chicagomanualofstyle.org]
