1. Course Overview:

Learning New Testament Greek is not an easy task nor an unachievable task. It is even more difficult for Chinese learners without a solid ground of English Grammar. In order to learn New Testament Greek successfully, the learning method and pace are essentially important.

In light of these foreseeable difficulties, this course does not only aim at establishing students with an effective learning method to learn NT Greek but also a solid foundation to understand New Testament (Koine) Greek including the basic grammatical building blocks, such as the syntax of verbs, nouns, pronuns, prepositions etc. The course will also introduce the basic ideas and nature of Greek phonology, morphology, syntax and vocabulary.

After the course, students able to:

- 2.1 Pronounce basic vocabulary
- 2.2 Equip with an effective learning method and habit of New Testament Greek
- 2.3 Analyze and evaluate the morphological transformation
- 2.4 Identify and evaluate elementary syntactic structures
- 2.5 Identify and make use of most frequently used vocabularies in New Testament
- 2.6 Translate simple Greek sentence into English
